

 - Balance security needs with operational and research requirements.
 - Refrain from negative actions such as starting rumors, making slanderous statements, and embarking on character assassination.



The requirements are simple: You need to have a minimum of five years of experience, even if only on a part-time basis, in industrial security; you need a recommendation from your supervisor, and you must agree to abide by the ISP® Code of

is to your advantage to answer every question even if it is only a guess. Once you are finished and submit it to Prometric, you will receive immediate feedback on whether you passed or failed, followed by a summary of results by section, which is usually emailed to you within an hour or two.

Becoming an ISP® means you join an elite group of security professionals who set themselves apart based on knowledge and experience from general security practioners in the field. You can use the ISP® designation with your name on your signature block so others will


